KP Roseville team offers skills for a lifetime

Jenna was among a group of 5 Kaiser Permanente Roseville Medical Center team members, including another nurse, a midwife and two physicians, who traveled to Sierra Leone in May to train local health care providers.

The Kaiser Permanente care team was led by **Joanie Seacrist, CNM**, a Roseville certified nurse midwife and founder of Hawa's Hope, an organization created to help promote safe birth in Sierra Leone, which has one of the highest maternal mortality rates in West Africa according to the World Health Organization.

Championing pediatric safety: Uncovering the hidden challenges of ED triage

In a pivotal study, San Rafael Emergency Department (ED) leaders **Tina J. Vitale-McDowell, MSN, RN, CPEN, PECC**, and **Dana Sax, MD**, have brought to light critical insights into the accuracy of triaging pediatric patients in the ED.

Their research, published in *JAMA Pediatrics*, reveals a troubling trend: nearly 60% of pediatric ED visits are overtriaged, and 7% are undertriaged, leading to significant consequences for patient safety, throughput, and the quality of care. Through their collaborative efforts, **Vitale-McDowell** and **Sax** are championing improvements in pediatric care that are essential for protecting our young patients.

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Nurses drive to reduce door-to-EKG time

"Our team takes a lot of pride in providing the best care to our patients by using evidence-based practice to create positive change," said **Damian Gulbransen, DNP, MBA, RN, NEA-BC**, Director of Emergency Services in Santa Rosa.

Gulbransen and her team implemented a new workflow to reduce door-to-EKG times, decreasing the time required to transfer ST Elevation Myocardial Infarction (STEMI) patients to specialized receiving centers.

"I am incredibly proud of the work done by our team of emergency department nurses and techs who recognized an opportunity... When change comes from those closest to the work, it sustains, and that is exactly what we've seen here in Santa Rosa."

"A key component of this initiative was the creation of an additional ED technician position dedicated to performing EKGs," added **Gulbransen**.

The standardized Rapid Cardiac
Assessment workflow they developed
led to a reduction in the length of stay for
STEMI patients. In addition, the average
time from door to transfer to a STEMI
receiving center for STEMI patients was
reduced by nearly 10 minutes.

The time from door-to-EKG has also been greatly reduced, showing the new approach's effectiveness.

Nurses in the emergency department in Redwood City addressed a similar issue



and implemented a quality improvement project focused on prompt EKG recognition and streamlined processes.

"Our door-to-EKG times for chest pain and STEMI patients dramatically improved," said **Sheila Rowe, MSN, RN, CEN**, Redwood City ED Nursing Unit Council Chair.

In 2023, 28% of patients with chest pain and 30% of patients with STEMI did not receive an EKG within 10 minutes of arrival to the Redwood City ED. Once the quality improvement project established a consistent practice for promptly recognizing patients requiring EKGs and streamlining the door-to-EKG process, for the 4 months following implementation, compliance with a door-to-EKG time of less than 10 minutes for chest pain patients increased to 86%, and for STEMI patients, compliance reached 100%.

Gratitude for lifesaving changes

A patient who recently presented to the Santa Rosa Emergency Department shared a positive experience. She cited the team's rapid response to her cardiac event, including timely EKG administration and prompt transfer to a specialized center, as instrumental in saving her life.

"I am incredibly proud of the work done by our team of Emergency Department nurses and techs who recognized an opportunity to change their workflow to provide even better care to our members. When change comes from those closest to the work, it sustains, and that is exactly what we've seen here in Santa Rosa," said **Gulbransen**.

Profile in care: Setting Sacramento nurse Ilya Guryanov up for success

Pathway to nursing


At 16, **Guryanov** took advantage of the opportunity to participate in the Kaiser Permanente Launch Program. The high school internship program not only introduced him to the world of health care but also set the stage for his future career in nursing.

At 18, he became a Patient Care Technician (PCT) at the Sacramento Medical Center, gaining invaluable experience while completing nursing school.

"I once cared for a patient who was receiving end-of-life care. The patient had been in the hospital for a while, steadily declining, but no family ever visited. As the patient's condition further declined and their final hours approached, I supported her as if she were my own family by playing oldies music and holding her hand as she took her last breaths. This experience taught me the importance of being compassionate and being there for my patients in their most vulnerable moments," explained **Guryanov**.

Following his role as a PCT, **Guryanov** was accepted into Kaiser Permanente's competitive new graduate program.

"I felt incredibly fortunate to be part of this elite group," he recalled.

Kaiser Permanente Santa Clara receives Beacon Award for Excellence, Silver Designation

The American Association of Critical-Care Nurses (AACN) has recognized the Cardiothoracic Telemetry Unit at Kaiser Permanente Santa Clara Medical Center with the Beacon Award for Excellence, Silver Designation. They are the latest to receive this honor joining the Intensive Care Units at the Roseville and San Leandro Medical Centers.

The recognition results from a 48-page application completed by Santa Clara Medical Center department leaders Ella Vallejo, MSN, RN, PHN, CNL, Gisha Gireesan, MSN, RN, CNL, NEA-BC, and RN staff. The unit outperformed national benchmarks for quality, work environment, and nursing workforce.

The award celebrates the dedication and hard work of the staff at the 31-bed surgical telemetry unit within a 327-bed hospital, which serves patients with heart failure, stroke, pacemaker placement surgeries, and other post-cardiothoracic surgical needs.

Spotlight on Tracy Broce, DNP, RN, CNS, CEN

Tracy Broce stands out as a paragon of dedication, perseverance, and excellence. Her journey from an emergency department volunteer at Kaiser Permanente 23 years ago to her current role as Northern California Regional Emergency Department Director exemplifies her unwavering commitment to health care.

Returning to UCSF after 2 decades to pursue her DNP, **Broce** demonstrated an insatiable thirst for knowledge and excellence. Her heart has always been in the emergency department, where she has profoundly impacted countless lives. Her distinguished DNP project, "Preventing Falls in Older Emergency Department Patients," led to a 37% reduction in falls in 2 Northern California EDs,

achieving 0 falls in the project's final month. For this remarkable achievement, **Broce** was awarded the Distinguished DNP Project Award.

"I'm very fortunate for the support from the Nurse Scholars Academy and was inspired to complete the program."

Tracy's accomplishments underscore the program's potential to enhance practice and effect change on a macro level within Kaiser Permanente communities.

Nurse-led program enhances skills for robotic surgery

Kaiser Permanente Northern California (NCAL) is at the forefront of surgical innovation, with nurses and surgical technologists (STs) playing a pivotal role in advancing robotic surgery, which offers benefits for patients, including smaller incisions, reduced pain, and faster recovery times.

"This advanced technology requires highly skilled perioperative staff to ensure optimal outcomes," said **Jenny Mendenhall, MSN, RN, CHSE, CNOR**, NCAL lead perioperative consultant. "Partnering with industry leaders, we developed a comprehensive training program that focuses on theoretical knowledge and hands-on experience."

In June, **Mimi Nguyen, RN**, Nursing Professional Development Practitioner at Kaiser Permanente San Francisco, piloted the first robotic "Train the Trainer" Kaiser Permanente NCAL training event.


The "Train the Trainer" program empowers experienced nurses and STs to become educators in their respective departments," said **Nguyen**.

By equipping these nurses and STs with advanced robotic skills and teaching methodologies, Kaiser Permanente NCAL aims to create a sustainable pipeline of qualified robotic team members.

Another initiative is the regional robotic surgery program which provides hands-on instruction and simulation to nurses, STs, and Sterile Processing Technicians (SPDs). The staff rotate through robotic stations to learn about the patient's experience, the surgeon's perspective, and troubleshooting the robot.

Ruth Leong, RN, who works at the Modesto Medical Center participated in the regionwide training, and said "I now have more knowledge, and am better equipped to answer questions from patients and their families about their robot-assisted surgeries."

"By investing in the professional development of our nursing and perioperative workforce, we are ensuring that our patients receive the highest quality care, delivered by highly skilled and knowledgeable clinicians," said **Mendenhall**.



Taking the trauma out of flu shots

As many parents can attest, taking a child to get a flu shot or a vaccination of any kind can cause stress, anxiety, and tears.

"As children get older, they become more aware and fearful of needles. When this happens, some kids really refuse to get vaccinated or it becomes very stressful, even traumatic," said **Judy Moreno, MSN, RN, CPAN, RN-BC**, Santa Clara perioperative clinical manager.

Moreno and colleagues at the Kaiser Permanente Santa Clara Medical Center identified an opportunity to provide the seasonal influenza shot to vulnerable patients between 6 months and 18 years old. They would give them the shot while under anesthesia for planned procedures or surgery, such as gastroenterology diagnostic tests, eye surgery, or dental restoration.

Santa Clara is the first Kaiser Permanente facility in Northern California with a flu vaccination program targeting surgical pediatric patients.

During this initiative's inaugural 2023 flu season, 202 patients were inoculated this way.

"The impact, so far, has been quite encouraging," said **Greg Neukirchner, MD**, pediatric anesthesiologist. He presented the idea to Santa Clara colleagues after learning about perioperative vaccination programs during a Society of Pediatric Anesthesia meeting.

Considered a success with young patients at Santa Clara, the program then expanded to offer the vaccine to developmentally challenged adults.

The benefits

"The benefit of administering the flu shot while under anesthesia is it's done seamlessly during a planned event," said **Moreno**. "It's really a non-event for the patient."

The delicate balance between professional and personal boundaries

Rebecca Lemons, MSN, RN, CPHON, BMTCN, and Erica Przybylski, BSN, RN, CPN, two seasoned pediatric hematology oncology nurses at Kaiser Permanente Oakland Medical Center, embarked on a study to explore the delicate balance between professional and personal boundaries in their field. The study is aimed at understanding the prevalence and impact of over-involvement among nurses working with children facing serious illnesses.


"Through a survey of 93 nurses, we discovered that a significant number had experienced or witnessed instances of over-involvement, such as sharing personal contact information, meeting patients outside of work, or even babysitting siblings," said **Lemons**. "While many respondents felt uncomfortable with such behaviors, they also acknowledged the challenges of maintaining boundaries in a demanding and emotionally charged environment."

The study highlighted the detrimental effects of over-involvement on both nurses and patients. Over-involved relationships can contribute to burnout, compassion fatigue, and a compromised work environment. To address this issue, the researchers advocate for increased education and support for nurses, including training on boundary setting, self-care strategies, and the importance of maintaining professional distance.

"Modeling good boundaries and encouraging self-check-ins along with monthly check-ins with nursing staff could help to decrease burnout and increase staff retention," said **Przybylski**. "The goal is to instill the idea or question in nurses: Would I do this for all my patients?"

By promoting a culture of healthy boundaries, Kaiser Permanente and other health care organizations can help protect the well-being of staff and ensure the highest quality of care for pediatric patients.

Lemons and **Przybylski** will present their study at the Association of Pediatric Hematology/Oncology Nurses conference this fall.

The cost of the teaching materials for the trip was sponsored by nurse leaders at the Roseville Medical Center.

The team shared their vast knowledge and years of clinical expertise in a series of lectures, and hands-on skills and simulation trainings at midwifery schools on topics including team communication, how to protect the health of an expectant mom, and complications which can arise during pregnancy and childbirth such as hypertension, sepsis, hemorrhaging, and obstructed labor.

"We had them practice as if they were providing real patient care by walking through a scenario that escalated or became emergent," said Jane Jach, MSN, RN, PHN, RNC-OB, EBP-C, nursing professional development specialist. "They were able to practice hands-on, real-time responses and develop their muscle memory for critical thinking."

"With each trip we are working towards capacity building," added **Seacrist**. "I could go and deliver 100 babies, but I can also go and train 100 midwives."

Empowering care + measuring impact

Hands-on training is their secret sauce, according to Janel Crawford, MD, Roseville OB/GYN, and co-director for Hawa's Hope. "People and companies like to donate equipment and other things, but nobody gives them any training on how to use it, or the teachers on how to teach it. And so, it just sits there."

"If you can teach people, then there's a ripple effect and they teach others," said **Andrea Sherman, MD, OB/GYN**.

Initially planning to deliver their workshops to about 200 people, they ended up with nearly 300 participants at a handful of midwifery schools, and accommodated a group of physician residents who heard they were in town.

To assess how well they were able to reach the goals teaching the midwives, they administered tests before and after each workshop. Overall, they saw a 13.6% increase in knowledge.

A rewarding experience

"The joy and resilience of midwives there was palpable despite the adversity and the conditions they are working in," shared **Jach**.



"The experience helped solidify my own nursing knowledge and bettered my practice," said **Ricks-Cosens**. "Going into a different country and having to pull yourself out of your own life and putting your own bias aside, it gave me a whole new perspective."

"I honestly walked away from this experience really knowing in my heart we've saved women even though we didn't directly touch any patients," added **Sherman**.

Championing pediatric safety: Uncovering the hidden challenges of ED triage

"This work is vital to support pediatric readiness and care in our EDs," said **Vitale-McDowell**. "It underscores our ethical responsibility to improve pediatric triage and ensure the safety of our most vulnerable population."

A collaborative effort is now underway involving Regional Quality, Maternal Child Health, Pediatric Emergency Medicine, and the Division of Research to further examine the impacts of mistriage.

To understand the challenges faced during triage, front-line staff from all 21 NCAL ED facilities are providing their insights.

"Emergency department triage is inherently a very challenging job. Triage nurses are asked to make triage assignments with limited time to take a history or review a chart, while simultaneously managing a busy waiting room and acting as the liaison between the waiting room and the back of the ED," explained **Sax**. "We are learning more about how triage is currently done, how it impacts patient outcomes and ED operations, and we can better support our front-line triage nurses in this difficult but critically important task of sorting patients on ED arrival."

The focus ahead will be on refining triage processes to better safeguard patient safety and reduce health care disparities. The insights gained from these initiatives are instrumental in supporting our triage nurses, enhancing the care we provide to pediatric patients.

"This collaborative work is paving the way for more accurate and equitable care in our emergency departments, ensuring that every child receives the attention they need when they need it most," said **Vitale-McDowell**.

During a patient's pre-op appointment, the medical team informs the parent or guardian of the option to receive the flu shot during the procedure, and the day of, they can opt-in to receive the shot.

"We have received a lot of positive feedback from many families, with especially positive responses for those patients with either needle phobia or disabilities where interactions in a health care setting is stressful," said **Neukirchner**. "It's a lot less stress on everyone, and they can receive the optimal preventive care they deserve."

The program captures children who are at more at risk for complications associated with flu.

"It's an important opportunity to protect this population, as many of them are at greater risk because of other health concerns," explained **Moreno**. "The more children we can vaccinate, the healthier our communities are."

A best practice

The Centers for Disease Control and the American Academy of Pediatrics both recommend providing the influenza vaccine to children and teenagers while under anesthesia for a surgery.

With preparations underway for the 2024 flu season, the Santa Clara team hopes to exceed last year's vaccination numbers. They seek to share their learnings and best practices with colleagues at other Kaiser Permanente facilities.

Moreno and colleagues will present a poster at the Kaiser Permanente National Nursing Conference in September.
